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INTRODUCTION

Role and Functions

The Sansthan was established in 1970 on the recommendations of the Kendriya Sanskrit Parishad as an autonomous organisation, registered under the Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 for the development and promotion of Sanskrit in the country. Its functions as an apex body for the propagation and development of Sanskrit and assists the Ministry of Education in the formation of various plans and schemes for the development of Sanskrit studies. It has also assumed the role for effective implementation of various recommendations made by the Sanskrit commission set up by the Govt. of India, Ministry of Education, in 1956 for propagation and development of Sanskrit language and education in all its aspects.

The major objectives of the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan as indicated in the Memorandum of Association are to propagate, develop and encourage Sanskrit learning and research and to serve as a central administrative and coordinating machinery for the management of all the Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas established or taken over.

Programmes and Activities

For the realisation of the objectives, the Sansthan undertakes the following programmes and activities :

Conducts teaching of Sanskrit on traditional lines at secondary, under-graduate, graduate, post-graduate and doctorate levels.

Conducts teachers' training at graduate and post-graduate levels.

Conducts examinations at secondary, graduation and post-graduation levels.

Conducts and coordinates research work in various disciplines of Sanskrit learning.

Cooperates with other organisations in sponsoring joint projects of common interest.

Builds up Sanskrit libraries and manuscripts collections: edits and publishes rare manuscripts and books of importance.

Functions as the Indian branch of the International Association of Sanskrit Studies and implements cultural exchange programme with Centres of Indology and Sanskrit studies abroad.

Teaching:

Teaching is conducted at Shastri and Acharya levels on the basis of a syllabus drawn up by the Sansthan in six of the seven Vidyapeethas, which are constituents of the Sansthan. Sanskrit institutions, managed by voluntary organisations and affiliated to the Sansthan, also impart teaching with the same syllabus. In all the Vidyapeethas there is a two-year buffer course of plus-two level called Prak-Shastri to facilitate students who come from non-traditional streams to fit in the traditional system of Sanskrit education adopted by the Sansthan.

In addition, in two of the Vidyapeethas, secondary level teaching

on the 10+2 pattern is also under taken. These classes act as feeder for our degree classes.

Teachers' Training:-

In six of the seven Vidyapeethas, teachers training of one year's duration, with emphasis on practical teaching, is conducted, leading to the award of Shiksha Shastri Degree, which is equivalent to B. Ed. In two Vidyapeethas at Delhi & Tirupati teachers' training at post-graduate level, leading to the award of Shikshacharya degree, equivalent to M. Ed., is also conducted.

Research :

One of the seven Vidyapeethas is exclusively meant for carrying out research in selected branches. Facilities exist in all the Vidyapeethas for students to enrol themselves for research, on successful completion of which the degree of Vidyavaridhi, which is equivalent to Ph. D. is awarded to them.

Publication :

The Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan brings out three prestigious journals, namely 'Sanskrit Vimarsha', 'Shodha Prabha' and 'Ganga Nath Jha Research Journal'. While the first journal is brought out by the sansthan Head quarters office, the other two are published by the Lal Bahadur Shastri Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, New Delhi, and Ganga Nath Jha Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Allahabad, respectively. In addition, publication of rare manuscripts, with commentaries is also undertaken in a phased programme.

Cultural Exchange and Collaboration:

In accordance with the provisions of the cultural exchange agreements entered into by the Govt. of India with foreign countries,

the Sansthan sends Sanskrit Scholars to various centres of Sanskrit studies abroad and receives scholars from these places. In addition, the Sansthan also takes active part in the international conferences and seminars. The Sansthan also collaborates with such international organisations whose objectives are similar to those of the Sansthan.

Structure and Administration:

The General Body is the policy making body of the Sansthan. The members of the General body of the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan are indicated in Annexure 'A'

The Shasi Parishad is the Executive Body of the Sansthan. In addition to Adhyaksha and Upadhyaksha there are five other members including the Financial Adviser of the Ministry of Education and the Deputy Educational Adviser (Skt). as ex-officio members. The composition of the Shasi Parishad for the year is given in annexure 'B'.

The Shasi Parishad is assisted by the following committees :

- (i) Artha Samiti
- (ii) Vidya Parishad
- (iii) Prakashan Samiti
- (iv) Pariksha Mandal
- (v) Shodha Samiti

The Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan functions through four sections: Academic, Examination, Administration and Finance. The academic Section consists of three branches, viz. Academic Branch, Research and Publication Branch and Correspondence course Branch. Each of these branches is headed by a Deputy Director. The examination section is headed by Deputy Controller of Examination. This branch has in addition an intermediary Officer of the rank of Assistant

Director. All these officers assist the Director of the Sansthan, who is the Principal Executive Officer responsible for the execution of policies and programmes approved by the General Body.

The Director of the Sansthan is appointed by the Government of India. During this year Dr. Mandan Mishra worked as Director.

Academic Section :

The Unit headed by Dr. Madhusudan Mishra is mainly responsible for having standards for academic performance, preparation of a calendar of the academic programme and for designing the syllabi for various courses. In addition, it also concerns itself with the work of affiliation of institutions and award of scholarships.

Research & Publication unit :

The Unit headed by Shri A. Sampathnarayanan is concerned with implementation and coordination of research and publication activities of the constituent Vidyapethas and of the Research and publication programme and projects of the Sansthan.

Correspondence Course Unit :

The Unit headed by Dr. K.N. Tiwari is responsible for the organisation of correspondence courses. These courses are offered at two levels, viz.

- (i) Introductory Course in Sanskrit
Ist Year (Hindi & English medium)
- (ii) Introductory Course in Sanskrit
2nd Year (Hindi & English medium)

Examination Section :

The Examination Section is headed by Sh. M.L. Sharma, Deputy

Controller (Exam.) and assisted by Shri S.C. Pant, Assistant Director (Exam.) This section organises Annual and Supplementary examinations for the following courses.

It also arranges evaluation of theses and Viva-voce examination for awarding research degrees for the students of Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas and affiliated research institutions.

Administration Section :

The Administration Section headed by Shri K. B. Chaube deals with general administration of the Sansthan and its constituent Vidyapeethas. The staffing, appointments and other establishment matters and control over Vidyapeethas are the main responsibilities of this section. The organizational charts are placed at the end.

Finance and Accounts Sections:

This section headed by Shri T. N. Dhar is concerned with the preparation of budget, receipt and distribution of grants, financial management and preparation of annual accounts, etc. It also manages provident funds and arranges for disbursement of scholarships awarded under the scheme of the Ministry of Education.

Vidyapeethas :

The Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan has so far established seven

CHAPTER II

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

A. Printing of Syllabus:

The syllabus for the various courses of the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan is unique in ways more than one. Though it follows the traditional system of education, it has also incorporated the essential aspects of the modern education. In this respect, it has followed the recommendations of the Sanskrit Commission. While laying stress on Sanskrit, it has given due place not only to English, Hindi and regional languages of India but also to the modern subjects like social studies, Mathematics, Science, History, Geography, Sociology and Economics from Prathama to Shastri, corresponding to Middle school to B.A. in the modern system of Education. While the Acharya courses in different subjects are typically traditional, the courses upto Shastri are in agreement with the modern system of Education, qualifying our graduates for services in the modern walks of life.

The syllabus and courses of studies have undergone several revisions after it was first formulated in 1970. It was recently revised in 1985 and printed for use during 1986-87 and onwards. During this year, it has been printed in five parts.

Part-I Prathama and Purva-Madhyama.

Part II Uttarmadhyama/Prak-Shastri

Part-III Shastri & Acharya

Part IV Shiksha Shastri

Part V Shikshacharya

B. Youtn Festival at Jammu

The Sansthan organised another youth festival in January 1986 in Ranbir Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Jammu, where selected students from all the Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas under the Sansthan, numbering about 100, assembled. Besides the academic programmes like debate in Sanskrit, essay competition Antyakshari etc. there were cultural programmes by the individual Vidyapeethas reflecting the regional taste and aptitude of the students.

It was participated by some officials of the Sansthan as well as by some scholars from outside, who acted as judges in various competitions.

This was also an occasion for the meetings of the Principals of the Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas and for the Research Committee meeting.

Scholarships:

The Sansthan operates three schemes of scholarships on behalf of the Ministry of Education. These are :—

(i) National Scholarship for Shastri and Acharya at the rate of Rs. 75/- per month and Rs. 100/-per month respectively.

(ii) Research scholarship for the students of traditional pathshalas at the rate of Rs. 300/- per month.

(iii) Post-Matric scholarship for students from Intermediate onwards upto Ph. D. at the rate of Rs.50/-, Rs.75, Rs.100 and Rs.300 per month respectively.

For some years these schemes have been compressed into two, comprising Intermediate, Shastri/B. A. and Acharya/M. A. on the one hand and Vidyavaridhi/Ph. D. on the other.

A major portion of the amount of Rs. 9.5 lakhs is paid to research students for Vidyavaridhi and Ph. D. in several Sanskrit and general Universities.

D. Work study in the Sansthan:

The Ministry of Education had appointed a team of experts for the work study in the Sansthan. The report is under consideration.

E. Sanskrit Day

The Sanskrit Day was organised on Raksha Bandhan Day in August jointly by the Ministry of Education, Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan and Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Delhi. Apart from a report by the Ministry and the Sansthan towards the propagation of Sanskrit, which is the usual feature of the Sanskrit Day every year, the first-ever Sanskrit film Adi Shankaracharya was shown to the learned public assembled there.

F. Vedic Sammelan.

During the year 1985-86 four regional vedic sammelans were convened by the Sansthan as per the orders of the Ministry at Ujjain, Poona, Ahmedabad and Vijayawada. The Vijayavada Vedic Sammelan was inaugurated by Sringeri Sankaracharya, His Holiness Shri Bharti Krishna Tirth Swami ji. This is a new feature recently started, since there was only one annual vedic sammelan previously convened by the Ministry every year. These regional vedic sammelans are intended

to bring together those vedic scholars who are not able to take part in the annual vedic sammelan which is held sometimes at far off places.

G. Seminars

The Sansthan in collaboration with the ICPR has been holding seminars on traditional Indian philosophies viz Nyaya, Mimamsa and Kashmir Saiva Darsana. During the year a Minmamsa seminar was convened at Tirupati wherein scholars from all parts of the country, both modern and traditional, were brought together for a healthy dialogue between the two schools of scholars. These deliberations have all been recorded and there is a proposal to edit and bring them into a book form for the benefit of research scholars.

H. Publications

A special issue of the research journal Sanskrit Vimarshs, to commemorate the memory of Smt. Indira Gandhi, was brought out by the Sansthan. This and another publication, proceedings of 5th World Sanskrit Conference held at Varanasi in 1981 were both released at a function held in the National Museum under the Chairmanship of Smt. Sushila Rohtagi, the then Minister of State for Education. These two volumes were released by the Hon'ble Lok Sabha Speaker Dr. Balram Jakhar. As per Sansthan's policy of bringing out "out-of-print text-books" for making available to the students, this year one of the important Mimamsa works called the Bhattadipika of Khanda Deva was brought out by photo offset process in four volumes.

Popularisation & Modernisation of Sanskrit :

Sanskrit is a classical language and it is hardly likely that all the students and public in general should be interested in learning it.

CHAPTER III

EXPANSION PROGRAMME

The Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan was established in 1970 with five constituent Vidyapeethas at Delhi, Tirupati, Jammu, Allahabad and Puri. The sixth Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha was established in Kerala in July, 1979 by taking over a Private Sanskrit Institution. Another Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha was established in Jaipur (Rajasthan) in July, 1983. The next Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha is expected to start functioning from July, 1986 at Lucknow.

The Kendriya Sanskrit Parishad resolved in 1970 that the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan should establish more Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas and coordinate their work. In implementing Parishad's recommendations, efforts are being made to establish Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas at several other places. As a consequence of these efforts about 10 acres of land have been obtained in Lucknow for the purpose of establishing a Vidyapeetha there.

There has been persistent demands from the State Governments for the establishment of Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas under the auspices of the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan. The Government of Madhya Pradesh has agreed to provide a plot of land for the establishment of a Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha at Bhopal.

The Shasi Parishad and the General Body of the Sansthan have

time and again underscored the need for opening Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas in the eastern States of India. With this end in view the possibility of establishing Vidyapeetha at Calcutta is being considered in consultation with various organisations and scholars in West Bengal. At present the Asiatic Society, already an institution of national importance, has sought affiliation with Sansthan for courses from Prakshastri to Acharya. Also the possibility of establishing Vidyapeethas in Assam and Manipur is being explored. For this purpose, the selection of site with due regard to the availability of physical facilities, possibility of providing infrastructure and the availability of sufficient number of students is under examination in consultation with the Departments of Education of these two Governments.

The Shikshacharya course has been introduced in the Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas of Delhi and Tirupati. Facilities for conducting research for the award of Vidya-Varidhi, equivalent to Ph. D. degree, exist in all the Vidyapeethas. The Sansthan is actively considering introduction of research at Post doctoral level for the award of Vachaspati degree, which is equivalent to D. Litt. of a University.

Every year new private institutions seek affiliation with Sansthan for various courses of studies. The institutions affiliated to Sansthan during 1985-86 are placed at Annexure 'C'. This year a Research Institution has been given affiliation for conducting research in Vedas and allied subjects.

CHAPTER IV

CORRESPONDENCE COURSE

The Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan has established a separate Unit under the Academic Section exclusively for Sanskrit teaching through correspondence. For more than 10 years this section has been organising Sanskrit Language teaching at preliminary stage through correspondence in both English and Hindi mediums. This course is divided into two levels of 21 lessons each and is covered through Correspondence in a maximum period of two years. Two lessons are despatched to the registered students every month and students, after grasping the lesson, are expected to answer the questions given in the response sheet at the end of each lesson. These response-sheets are returned by students to the Head-quarters Office of the Sansthan, where they are evaluated by the evaluators, and the corrected response sheets are returned to the students for their guidance.

During the year 1985 i.e. from January to December, 1985, 477 students were registered for these two courses as per details given below :

Since the constituent Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas of the Sansthan are working as contact points, it has been decided to hold contact programme in these Vidyapeethas, where the students of the region will be invited to have a face to face contact with teachers, so that difficulties encountered by them during study through Correspondence can be removed.

This course is being organised free of cost but, in order to ensure that only genuine students are enrolled, a token annual fee of Rs.15/- per student in India and US\$ 10 per student abroad is charged from the aspirants.

In order to make these courses more popular and to enable a larger number of aspirants to avail of this facility, a number of steps were taken by the Sansthan : a wide publicity was made in English and vernacular press through the Directorate of Audiovisual Publicity; letters were addressed to foreign Embassies and Consulates in Delhi and to Vice-Chancellors of the Universities in India, and so on. As a result of these efforts, in addition to young students, a number of high ranking officers and people in various vocations have registered their names with the Sansthan and are learning Sanskrit through the correspondence course.

Those who complete these courses successfully get a certificate entitled 'Sanskrit Pravasha'.

CHAPTER V

CURRICULUM, EQUIVALENCE AND RECOGNITION

In the school section of our Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas at Jammu and Puri, the 10+2 pattern has been adopted. While the syllabus for various disciplines in Sanskrit is formulated by the Syllabus Committee appointed for the purpose, for modern subjects the syllabus prescribed by the Central Board of secondary Education has been adopted. The curriculum for Shastri is of the same standard as that prevalent in Indian Universities. A number of disciplines in Sanskrit are taught as separate subjects. That is, in addition to Sahitya and Vyakaran, subjects like Siddhanta Jyotish, Phalit Jyotish, Nyaya, Vedanta, Jain Darshan, etc. are also taught as separate subjects. In order to bring them on par with students reading in modern Universities, students of Shastri classes are also required to study modern subjects like English, Hindi, Sociology, Political Science, Economics, etc. For these subjects, courses of studies prescribed in Delhi University have been adopted, while for Shastric subjects the curriculum and syllabi are framed by different syllabus committees appointed for the purpose. At Acharya level facilities exist only for various Shastric subjects, the curriculum for which has also been framed on the advice of the Expert Committees. The teaching in all the constituent Vidyapeethas as also in the affiliated Institutions is carried out on the basis of the prescribed syllabus.

In case of teachers' Training, provision has been made both for the theoretical and practical training. Here again curriculum framed is of the same standard as is prescribed for the corresponding B.Ed. classes in Delhi University. The equivalence of the Sansthan's examination with those of the modern system of education is detailed below :

A number of State Governments have recognised the degrees awarded by the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan for purposes of employment (See Annexure—'D'). Likewise, the Association of Indian Universities, as also a number of Universities and Education Boards, have given recognition to the degrees awarded by the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan for purposes of admission in higher classes. A list of such Universities and Boards which have recognised Sansthan's Degrees is given in Annexure 'E'. The annexure also indicates the equivalence prescribed by them to various degrees.

A scheme under which the teachers in Vidyapeethas will be asked to prepare text books for various standards and present them to the Sansthan for final approval is proposed to be launched. The idea is to bring out a set of books by the Sansthan's teachers themselves and publish them for the benefit of students studying in different Vidyapeethas.

TEACHING AND EVALUATION

(a) Enrolment

All Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas except that at Allahabad are engaged in teaching. The Allahabad Vidyapeetha is meant for Research and Publication. A number of students are also registered for Vidyavaridhi.

The Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas at Puri and Jammu are engaged in teaching from Prathama to Acharya, but other Vidyapeethas teach from Prak-Shastri to Acharya. The students admitted in various courses during the year under report are stated on the next page.

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(B) Examinations:

At the end of every academic year, in the month of April, the Sansthan holds public examinations for the final year of Purva Madhyama, Uttar Madhyama and Prak-Shastri courses and for the graduate & post-graduate level courses, including the teachers training courses leading to Shiksha Shastri and Shikshacharya (B. Ed. and M. Ed.) degrees.

Even for the final year of Prathama and previous year of Purva Madhyama, Uttar Madhyama and Prak-Shastri, questions are set by the Sansthan. The details of students appearing for the 1986 annual examination are placed below :

CHAPTER VII

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

A. Administration

The Administration section of the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan continued to perform its function of house keeping in accordance with the rules, regulations and procedures of the Sansthan. It provided the necessary support to the various constituent Vidyapeethas of the Sansthan for their effective and efficient functioning.

The Administration wing in the Headquarter Office of the Sansthan mainly deals with general administration, establishment matters, services and supply, acquisition of land and building, establishment of new Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas, conducting meetings of Shasi Parishad and General Body of the Sansthan and execution of their decisions.

During the year under report, 17 posts of Readers and 40 posts of Lecturers were created and necessary actions were taken to fill them up. In addition, about 111 temporary posts in various categories were converted into permanent. Three meetings of the Departmental Promotion Committee were also held for confirmation of the officiating staff against permanent vacancies and also to consider the cases of Efficiency Bar and Probation period. Opening of new Vidyapeethas was pursued with various state Governments concerned.

A piece of land measuring about half an acre has been allotted

to the Sansthan for construction of its office building. Efforts are being made for construction of its building through the CPWD.

B. Finance

As in earlier years, the Sansthan was fully financed by the Ministry by way of grant-in-aid. During 1985-86 the grant of Rs.2,16,39000 (excluding unspent balance of previous year 23.63 lakhs) was further distributed as under :-

These funds were utilized during the year and an unspent balance of Rs. 29.9 lakhs was left over to be spent during the first few months of the following financial year till the first instalment of the grant-in-aid was received, The consolidated Receipt and Payment account for the year 1985-86 is given in annexure 'F'

The accounts for 1984-85 of individual Vidyapeethas were got audited by the respective Accountants General, acting as sub-audit Officers of the Directors of Audit, Central Revenues, and these were consolidated and submitted to DACR for audit and certification

during the year under report. However these accounts alongwith audit report were placed before both the Houses of Parliament during subsequent year.

With the efficient management of the finance of the Sansthan and its constituent Vidyapeethas, it has been possible to pay an amount of Rs. 15, 48, 219 to the Jaipur Development Authority, being the cost of land provided for the Vidyapeetha at Jaipur.

In addition to the management of the maintenance grant, the finance section of the Sansthan also arranged distribution of scholarship to various universities under the schemes of the Ministry. For this purpose, the Ministry had released a total grant of Rs. 9.50 lakhs, which was fully utilised in awarding scholarship and only a small unspent balance was left over.

To publish unpublished works of importance.

To conduct evening Sanskrit classes.

This Vidyapeetha consists of four wings, viz. Pedagogy wing, Acharya wing, Research and publication wing and Library wing.

Pedagogy Wing

This wing was started in 1962 to train Sanskrit scholars who are appointed in higher secondary schools. This training is imparted purely in Sanskrit medium. More than thousand trainees have left this Vidyapeetha from 1962 onwards, having obtained B. Ed. degree called **Shiksha Shastri**. Every year the contingent of trainees represents many states.

Students and student-trainees discuss and speak on various topics in the science of education in weekly seminars conducted on every Thursday.

One Reader and six lecturers are on the faculty rolls of this wing

As per usual practice, training in Scout and First Aid was imparted in the month of September, 1985 and March, 1986. The educational tour was conducted in February, 1986.

In the examinations held in May, 1985 over 75% students were declared passed.

For the last two years Shiksha-Acharya (M. Ed.) class has also been introduced.

Acharya Wing :

One Professor, Four Readers, Five Lecturers and Two Junior Lecturers are on the faculty rolls of this wing. In this wing the students are enrolled for Prak-Shastri (Intermediate), Shastri (B.A.), Acharya

CHAPTER VIII

VIDYAPEETHAS

The Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan runs seven Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeethas, the academic year starting from the month of July every year.

These Vidyapeethas are centres of learning. Teaching and research are conducted at six out of seven Vidyapeethas; from Prathama to Acharya and Vidyavaridhi at Puri and Jammu and from Prak-Shastri to Acharya and Vidyavaridhi elsewhere. Only the Allahabad Vidyapeetha is restricted to research for Vidyavaridhi and for publication. Separate report in respect of each Vidyapeetha is presented below :

Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Tirupati

This Vidyapeetha was established in this holy town, Tirupati, in the year 1962 by the Central Government with the five most sought after and important objectives, namely:

- To promote studies in shastras like Vyakarana, Purva and Uttar Mimamsa, Nyaya, etc.
- To inculcate and encourage research activity both in traditional and modern methodology.
- To procure and preserve manuscripts.

(M.A.) and Vidyavaridhi (Ph. D.) courses. Admission to all classes is open to all Indian citizens without any disparity whatsoever. Under Shastric studies, Sahitya, Vyakarana, Vedanta, Nyaya and Jyotisha are offered, and under modern subjects English and History are taught. Among modern Indian Languages, Hindi and Telugu are taught.

In the last year's examinations students passed in a most satisfactory percentage. About 20 scholars are engaged in research on various topics under this wing.

In the weekly seminar that is being held every Friday, students speak on Shastric and modern topics in Sanskrit medium. They also take part in competitions like Antyakshari, Samasyapurti and Ashubhashanam, etc.

Research and Publication Wing :

Two Lecturers and Two Research Assistants are undertaking the Agama Kosa Project in this wing.

Library Wing:

About 36000 volumes of books are deposited in the library. In the manuscripts section about 4500 manuscripts are preserved. About 800 research periodicals have also been procured by this library. Two Assistant Librarians Gr. 1, One Assistant Librarian Gr. II. One L. D. C., One Copyist, two Library pundits and one class IV employee are employed in this wing. The librarian's post is vacant at the moment.

Tape Recording of Ved as:

Tamraparni and Gurjaragana of Ranayaniya Sakha of Samaveda, Samaveda of Tamilnadu region, Rigveda of Gokarna region, Rigveda of Kerala region, Taittireeya Samhita, Ranayaniya Sakha of Sama-

veda of Karnataka region, Atharvana Veda of Pappalada Sakha along with Karmakanda, are hitherto recorded on tapes. The project is undertaken jointly by Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanams, Tirupati and Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Tirupati.

Tape Recording of Mimamsa:

The Ford Foundation has come forward with a project of tape recording of discourses made by eminent scholars about the main topics of Mimamsa, as this particular shastra is rarely studied presently and it is feared that the number of scholars too in this shastra will be diminishing in future. This Vidyapeetha was asked to take up this project by the Sansthan. Dr. M.D. Balasubrahmanyam is appointed as Director to undertake this work.

Publication of Vidyapeetha:

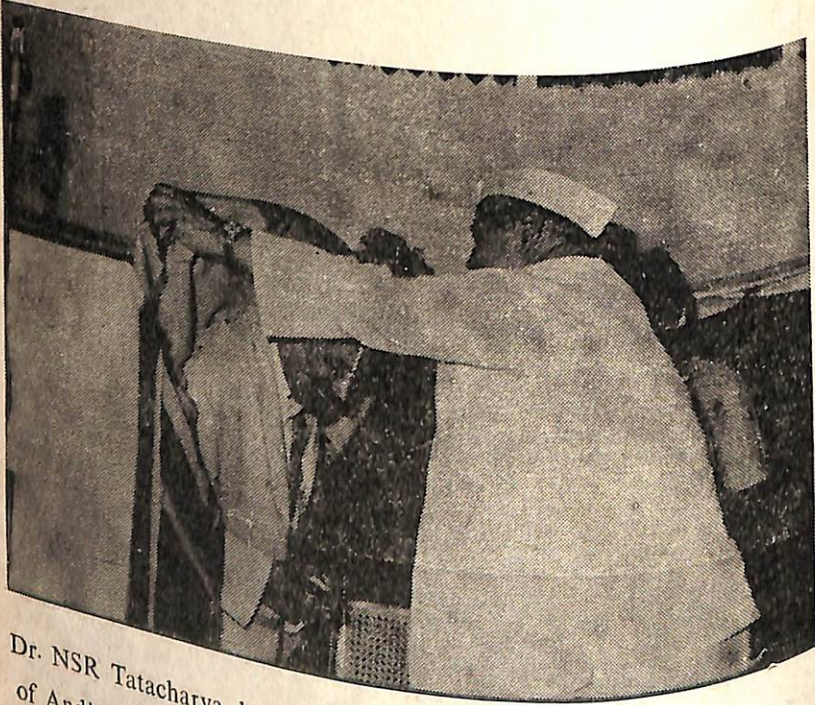
35 books on traditional and modern subjects have been published by the Vidyapeetha over the years. About ten books are ready to be sent to the press.

Evening Sanskrit Classes:

Evening Sanskrit Classes are conducted in various centres in and around Tirupati for the benefit of high school students. The syllabus of Parichaya, Abhijna, Vichakshana, Samartha and Kovida of Sanskrita Bhasa Prachara Samiti, Chittoor, is being taught in these centres.

Extension Lectures

Vidyapeetha arranges extension lectures in Veda, Vyakarana, Vedanta, Sahitya, Nyaya and Shiksha Sastra by eminent scholars in the subjects concerned. This year Dr. Sankara, Director, S.V. Oriental Research Institute had inaugurated the series of extension lectures on 4.2.86. The lectures were as follows :

Functions:

Annual convocation took place on 31.3.85. His excellency Dr. Sankar Dayal Sharma, Governor of Andhra Pradesh had delivered convocation address. Dr. T.N.Dhar, Jt. Educational Adviser, Government of India, presided over the function. Dr. Mandan Mishara, Director, Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan distributed prizes. Dr. M. D. Balasubrahmanyam was felicitated with a citation on the occasion of his retirement as Principal, Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Tirupati.

Shastra Chudamani

Shri K.C. Pant, Honourable Ministr of Education and Culture, Government of India, had inaugurated the project of protectiong the traditional way of studying the Shastras on 14.6.85.

The learned scholars under this scheme had demonstrated the traditional teaching on this occasion. His excellency Dr. Shankar Dayal Sharma, Governor of Andhra Pradesh, had presided over the function. On 9.10.85 Ganesh Chaturthi and Sanskrit Day celebrations were conducted. Prof. V. Anjaneya Sharma, Sanskrit Deptt. S. V. University, was the Chief Guest on this occasion.

Success of Vidyapeetha students in various competitions:

Inter-Vidyapeetha Youth festival was conducted at Jammu

Vidyapeetha this year. Seven prizes were won by students of Tirupati Vidyapeetha. Tirupati Vidyapeetha got first prize in Mono-acting in cultural competitions.

All India Sanskrit Elocution competitions were held in August in the presence of his Holiness Sri Chandrasekharendra Saraswati Swamiji of Kanchi Kamakoti peetham at Kanchi. Eight students from Tirupati Vidyapeetha were sent to participate and got seven prizes collectively. This batch stood second in All India level.

Vidyapeetha students have participated in various inter-collegiate competitions in Tirupati.

II. SHRI LAL BAHADUR SHASTRI KENDRIYA SANSKRIT VIDYAPEETHA, NEW DELHI-16.

This Vidyapeetha was established by the All India Sanskrit Sahitya Sammelan on the Vijaya Dashami day of the year 1962, with a view to fulfil the following aims and need for an International Sanskrit Institute in the capital of India:-

1. To impart instructions in higher Sanskrit learning, including neglected & highly specialised branches, with a view to preserving the traditional erudite Sanskrit learning;
2. To co-ordinate Sanskrit Studies;
3. To conduct research in Sanskrit pedagogy and provide for training of Sanskrit teachers;
4. To provide facilities for the study of such languages and literatures of Asia as have a bearing on Sanskrit studies;
5. To bring out literature on Sanskrit, including translation, concerning both ancient and modern knowledge;

6. To arrange publication of Research works and Journals and aid to Research, such as indexes, digests and bibliographies;
7. To collect, preserve and publish manuscripts, to build up a National Sanskrit Library and a Sangrahalaya, having bearing on Sanskrit studies, such as Sruta, Ayurveda, Yoga and Vastuvidya, and so on;
8. To provide facilities for Research in Sanskrit through traditional as well as modern methods;
9. To provide facilities for any other line of work for the development of Sanskrit learning.

The Vidyapeetha was fortunate to have the late Prime Minister Sh. Lal Bahadur Shastri as its Founder President. During his stewardship it was registered under the name 'Akhil Bharatiya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha'.

The Vidyapeetha got a good lease of life under the inspiring guidance of late Sh. Shastriji who took keen interest in the development of the institution even while holding the august office of the Prime Minister. In the convocation address of Varanaseya Sanskrit Vishvavidyalaya (26th December, 1964) and on 27th November, 1965 in the presence of late Maharajadhiraja Shri Mahendra of Nepal on the occasion of foundationstone-laying ceremony of the Vidyapeetha, he declared his intention to make the Vidyapeetha an International Sanskrit Institute. He continued to be its Chairman till the last moments of his life and under his leadership this institution carved out an important place for itself among the Sanskrit teaching institutions of this country in a short span of three years.

After his death, looking to the services of the Vidyapeetha and late Shastriji's historic association with it, the Prime Minister of India Smt. Indira Gandhi, also accepted to be the Chairman of this Vidya-

peetha. Late Dr. A.N. Jha, the then Lt. Governor of Delhi was the acting President and contributed a lot to its development. On 2nd October, 1966, as a mark of respect to the services of Shri Shastriji and to give it the patronage of the Govt. of India, Smt. Indira Gandhi declared to name it 'Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri Rashtriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha'.

The Government of India, Ministry of Education, took over the Vidyapeetha as an autonomous body with effect from 1st April, 1967 and constituted a committee for its management. At present this Vidyapeetha is working under the auspices of the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan as an institute of higher studies in Sanskrit.

From 1962 to 1968 the Vidyapeetha was affiliated to Shri Kameshwar Singh Darbhanga Sanskrit Vishwa-Vidyalaya (Bihar) and followed its syllabi and scheme of examinations in all the classes, i.e. Shastri, Shiksha-Shastri and Acharya. During the years 1969-70, the Vidyapeetha, under the recommendation of the Ministry of Education, Govt. of India, was affiliated to the Varanaseya Sanskrit Vishwavidyalaya, which very kindly arranged for the special courses of study for this Vidyapeetha and thus set a new precedent in the history of Sanskrit education.

From the year 1971, the Vidyapeetha has been following the syllabus of the Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan and prepares and guides students for obtaining the Prak-Shastri, Shastri, Shiksha-Shastri, Acharya, Shikshacharya, Vidyavaridhi(Ph.D.)degrees of the Sansthan.

At present this Vidyapeetha is running in its own premises of eleven-acre land, adjacent to Jawaharlal Nehru University Campus at Shaheed Jeet Singh Marg. There are fifty rooms in the building of the Vidyapeetha in which adequate arrangements have been made for

several salient activities like Library, Reading room, Research cells and Seminar-room. The Vidyapeetha has its own hostel furnished with all the modern amenities, with residential arrangements made for 96 students. It has also forty eight residential quarters for all categories of employees.

PRESENT ACTIVITIES

The Vidyapeetha has set before it the goal of emerging as an International centre for Sanskrit studies. However, for the present, looking to the available means, the Vidyapeetha is conducting the following activities :

Faculty of Prachina Shastras

This faculty was started in the year 1962. At present, teaching facilities are available for three years graduate and two years post-graduate courses in the following subjects:- (1) Shukla Yajurveda, (2) Dharmashastra, (3) Karmakand, (4) Sarvadarshana, (5) Sankhya Yoga, (6) Advaita Vedanta (7) Prachina Nyaya Vaisheshika, (8) Navya Nyaya, (9) Jain Darshana, (10) Prachina Vyakarana, (11) Navya Vyakarana, (12) Siddhanta Jyotisha. (13) Phalita Jyotish, (14) Puranetihasa, and (15) Sahitya.

On successful completion of these courses, Shastri and Acharya degrees are awarded to the students.

There is a special provision of two years Prak-Shastri course for those who have passed High School or equivalent examination without Sanskrit from a recognised Examination Board. With a view to enrich the studies with the modern scientific knowledge, arrangements have been made for imparting instructions in modern subjects like Political Science, Sociology, History, Hindi, English, Physical Education etc.

This year 410 students were studying under this faculty. Details are given below :-

In the last examinations held in 1985, the result of this faculty was 97% in Prak-Shastri, 67% in Shastri and 71.5% in Acharya.

One Professor, 16 Readers, 7 Lectures and Two Junior Lecturers were working in this faculty during the year under reference.

Faculty of Education

This faculty was started in the year 1964 with a view to making trained Sanskrit teachers available to the country. This faculty conducts two training courses, each of one year duration at graduate and post-graduate levels. On successful completion of these courses, the students are awarded 'Shiksha-Shastri' (B.Ed.) and Shiksha-Acharya (M.Ed.) degrees.

In Shiksha Shastri, besides Educational Psychology, Educational Philosophy, School Management, Modern Educational Problems, Methods of teaching Sanskrit language and Physiology, the students are imparted training in some experimental lessons, art, scouting and First-Aid also.

In Shikshacharya course, arrangements have been made to impart educational training at higher level. The students study philosophy of Education, Advanced Psychology, Educational Research,

Statistics, vocational educational guidance, educational administration and Supervision, training to teachers, besides writing research dissertation on educational topics.

286 students were studying under this faculty in the current year :

Shiksha Shastri 279

Shiksha Acharya 7

One Professor, Five Readers, One Senior Lecturer and 4 Lecturers were working in this faculty during the year 1985-86.

As part of the curriculum, training in scout and first-aid was imparted in the month of December, 1985 and September-October, 1985.

In the examinations held in April/May, 1985, the result of Shiksha Acharya was 80% and Shiksha Shastri 89%.

Faculty of Research & Publication

This faculty was started in the year 1964, keeping in view the importance of co-ordination of ancient Indian Philosophical thinking and Modern methodology of research. At present the following activities are being conducted under this faculty :

1. (a) Research by students

In this department students are registered for prosecuting work on various branches of Sanskrit learning like Veda, Purana, Darshana, Jyotisha, Agama, Karma Kanda, Alamkarashastra, Sahitya, Vyakarana, Histroy, editing of unpublished manuscripts and education. These students are awarded Vidyavaridhi degree of 'Rasht-

riya Sanskrit Sansthan, after completion of their research work. As many as 93 students are working in this department.

Nine Students submitted their thesis for the award of Vidyavaridhi degree during the year.

One Reader, two Lecturers and 3 research assistants are working in this faculty.

(b) Research Seminars

In order to boost up the research tendency of the students engaged in research work, this department organises a weekly seminar regularly, wherein the research scholars and teachers of the Vidya-peetha read papers and group discussions are held. Lectures of reputed scholars are also arranged from time to time. Twenty eight seminars have so far been arranged in the current academic year.

2. Independent research projects undertaken by teachers of the Vidya-peetha and other reputed scholars

Under this scheme, rare and obsolete texts of Sanskrit literature are critically edited or translated with commentaries thereon by reputed scholars of various branches of Sanskrit learning. Fifty such works have been published so far and work is in process on eight other texts.

3. (a) Departmental Research Work

The Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan has approved an extensive project of compiling a 'Dictionary of Indian Philosophy' for the research department of the Vidyapeetha. The project envisages the collection of references from traditional texts of all the systems of Indian Philosophy. This work will be highly beneficial to those who are engaged in prosecuting research on Indian Philosophy. At present the work

on 'Sankhya Yoga Darshana' is going on. The first part has been completed and is ready to be given to the press.

The editing work of 'Krishna-Yajurvediya Taittiriya-Sambhita (with Sayana-Bhashya) alongwith Hindi-translation and commentary by late M.M. Parameshvarananda Shastri (II part) is being done by this department.

(b) *Darshana-Kosha-Workshop*

The department organises 'Darshana-Kosha-Workshops' from time to time with a view to getting the work evaluated and to obtain suggestions to be followed in the process of preparation of 'Bharatiya Darshana Kosha'. Extensive discussions are held by reputed philosophers of the country in these workshops.

(c) *Research Journal*

A half yearly Journal was started by this department as 'Adhyayanamala'. Now instead of Adhyayanamala, 'Shodha Prabha', a quarterly research journal, is regularly being published for the last eight years. This journal comprises research articles of the reputed scholars of the Vidyapeethas as well as from outside, ancient unpublished small works, lectures delivered in the Sharadya Jnana Mahotsava and review of the newly published works. This year a special volume on the occasion of birth centenary of late Dr. Rajendra Prasad, the first President of India, has been published.

(d) *Publications*

In order to bring forward the research works being prosecuted under this department, a publication scheme is going on since the inception of this Vidyapeetha.

The Vidyapeetha published the following works during the year :

Vidyapeetha Panchanga

With a view to giving all round training to the students doing research in the field of Jyotisha, Vidyapeetha has started to publish a Panchanga from the year 1982-83. An observatory has been established and it will be completed very soon.

Shastra Chudamani Project

The Vidyapeetha is running Shastra Chudamani scheme for the last three years. Under this scheme, arrangements have been made to impart teaching facilities to such scholars as are interested in getting deep knowledge of a particular shastra. At present two eminent scholars are working in different subjects.

Sharadiya Jnana Mahotsava and Shastriya Vyakhyanamala

With a view to disseminating the knowledge concerning Indian culture and Sanskrit literature, the Vidyapeetha has been organising lecture series from its very beginning. These lectures are being organised from time to time under 'Sharadiya Jnanamahotsava', 'Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri Smaraka Vyakhyanamala' and 'Vasanta Vyakhyana-mala'.

These lecture series have proved very useful for propagation of marvellous contents of our traditional shastras. At the same time our great leaders and intellectuals are apprised of the activities of the Vidyapeetha with the help of these series.

The students participated in various all-India, Inter-University and Inter-college competitions and secured prizes and shields.

III Ganganath Jha Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Allahabad

This Vidyapeetha is a specialised institution for research and publications only. During the year the programme of publications continued with vigour apart from the research projects being undertaken by the staff members.

This Vidyapeetha is also the headquarters for the project "Collection and Preservation of Manuscripts". They have so far collected more than 45000 manuscripts and further search for locating manuscripts was continued with vigour. In addition they have been entrusted with the task of micro-filming the Kashmir manuscripts in store with the University of Kashmir at Srinagar and they have filmed nearly 100 works so far. This work will continue further.

The convocation of this Vidyapeetha was held during January 1986

His Holiness Shri Shankaracharya of Kanchi Kamakoli Peetham also paid a visit to the Vidyapeetha.

His Excellency Shri R. Venkataraman, Vice-President of India delivered the convocation address and distributed the degrees.

IV Shree Sadashiv Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Puri

This Vidyapeetha is running under Sanshan since 1971. It has both school and college sections. A dozen of Sanskrit scholars, both from the Vidyapeethas under the Sansthan and outside gave lectures on various subjects during the year under report.

Under Extension lecture series many eminent scholars delivered

lectures on various subjects. The students of this Vidyapeetha took part in the All India Elocution contest held at Ujjain (M.P.) from 19th to 21st March, 1985 conducted by Kalidas Academy. They won prizes in Vyakarna, Dharmasastra and Sahitya. Some of the students took part in various competitions outside the Vidyapeetha in Puri and won prizes.

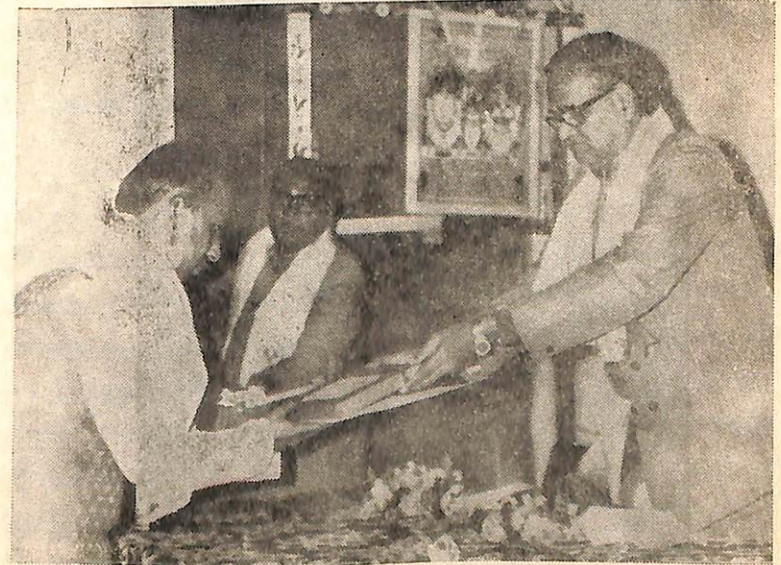

The First-Aid and Health Education training programme was organised in the Vidyapeetha. Sixty five Shiksha shastri students had undergone this training programme. Dr. Jagmohan Mishra, Assistant Surgeon of I.D. Hospital, Puri had conducted this course. This year an excursion Party of the Vidyapeetha consisting of 22 students visited Allahabad, Agra, Mathura and Brindaban, Delhi, Hardwar, Rishikesh, Jammu, Srinagar and Gulmarg. On the eve of Vidyapeetha Annual Function and Convocation, one Sanskrit Drama 'Matrushakti' and Oriya Drama 'Bikshata Gajati' were played by girls and boys respectively, followed by opening Odisi Dance. This year 43 Acharya students and Shiksha-Shastri students have come successful in the Sansthan Examination. This year the IIIrd Inter-Vidyapeetha Youth Festival was held at Sri Ranbir Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Jammu (J&K) on 26th, 27th and 28th October, 1985. About ten students of this Vidyapeetha participated in the Festival and won Shield for the year.

V. Shri Ranbir Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Jammu

The Vidyapeetha is one of the two which has separate secondary stage wing in addition to graduate and post-graduate college section. The secondary stage has been modelled on 10+2 pattern and is manned by five postgraduate and six trained graduate teachers. The college section is manned by 2 Readers, 9 Lecturers and 3 Jr. Lecturers. In addition, there are three teachers in the teacher's training wing. Under the Shastra-Chudamani scheme, distinguished scholars of Vyakaran, Nyaya, Darshan and Jyotish are engaged for indepth teaching in these disciplines.

The Vidyapeetha library consists of more than 22,000 books and a reading room equipped with a number of magazines. The Shaiv

Darshan Kosha project, initiated in the Vidyapeetha, has made a significant progress in the collation of the technical terminology used in Kashmir Shaiv Darshan and in the preparation of the fascicule for circulation among the scholars. This Vidyapeetha has so far published 15 books. During the year under report Brangish Samihta was brought out. Sanskrit day was celebrated in the Vidyapeetha on 30. 8. 85. The Annual sports of the Vidyapeetha were held in February, 1986. On this occasion arrangements for friendly Matches were made and prizes were given to the winners and runners teams. The students of the Vidyapeetha went for picnic to Jawalji (Himachal Pradesh). The students of Shiksha Shastri went on Education tour and visited different places of Himachal Pradesh. The students of Shastri & Acharya final classes went on Educational tour and visited Madras, Tirupati, Mysore and Bangalore.

The convocation of the Vidyapeetha was held in October, 1985. Shri Gauri Nath Shastri, Vice-Chancellor, presided over the convocation function. Third Inter-Vidyapeetha youth Festival was held in Jammu Vidyapeetha in October, 1985. On this occasion participants

from all the Vidyapeethas participated. Eminent scholars like Dr. R.K. Sharma, Shri Gauri Nath Shasti and Dr. Jayamanta Mishra witnessed the Festival. The students of Jammu Vidyapeetha won 1st Prize in Sanskrit Drama competition.

VI. Guruvayoor Kendriya Sanskrit Vidyapeetha, Puranattukara.

This Vidyapeetha was taken over by the Sansthan in July, 1979. It was running in the old building at Pavaratty. Now it has shifted to Puranattukara near Trichur. A series of Extension Lectures were arranged and held on 19th, 20th and 21st March, 1986. Shri P.K. Raghupathy, Executive Editor 'Express', Trichur had graced the function on 19th March, 1986. Prof. R.V. Joshi from Delhi University delivered three lectures on 'Nimbarkacharya', Prof. P.C. Vasudevan Elyath, Dr. R. Karunakaran. Dr. Sudhansu Chaturvedi and Prof K.P. Narayana Pisharodi participated in the functions held on all the three days. Prof. Satya Vrat Sastri of the Delhi University delivered two lectures on Kalidas's Kavyasoundarya.

The teachers of this Vidyapeetha participated in the extra-curricular programme mentioned below:-

N.C.E.R.T. workshop conducted at Pavaratty from 27th January, 1986 to 31st January, 1986.

The research committee of this Vidyapeetha met on 26th January, 1986 in the Puranattukara Campus of the Vidyapeetha under the Chairmanship of Dr. N.P. Unni. Prof and Head of the Department of Sanskrit, University of Kerala, Trivandrum. The

Shiksha Shastri and the Acharya students had undertaken an educational tour programme to Bangalore and Mysore.

The convocation to confer the Sansthan's Degrees on the students who came out successful in the public examinations of 1984 was held on the 1st of April, 1985 in the Sahitya Academy Hall, Trichur. Dr. K. Gopalan, Vice-Chancellor, Cochin University presided over the convocation. Dr. Mandan Mishra, Director, Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan distributed the prizes to the students who distinguished themselves in the various examinations. Dr. T.N. Dhar, Joint Educational Advisor, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government India, New Delhi delivered the convocation address. Students participated in the Inter-Vidyapeeth Youth Festival held at Jammu and two of them received the coveted first prize in Antyakshari competition and cultural programme.

KENDRIYA SANSKRIT VIDYAPEETHA, JAIPUR

This Vidyapeetha was started in July 1983 with Park-Shastri, Shastri, Acharya and Shiksha-Shastri courses. The first publication of this Vidyapeetha is Madhava Swatantryam Natakam by Prof. Gopinath Dadhich. It is still under print. Dr. Vidya Niwas Mishra delivered a lecture in Sanskrit on the salient features of Indian thinking on 28.7.85. On 21.11.85 Dr. R.P. Dwivedi of Banaras Hindu University delivered a lecture on Kalidas. On 5.12.85 Dr. Harsh Nath Mishra of Delhi Vidyapeetha delivered a lecture on sentiments consisting of *Joy* and *Sorrow*. Two students of this Vidyapeeth won prizes in Inter Vidyapeetha Festival held in Jammu in October, 1985. The first Aid Camp was organised by the students of the Vidyapeetha in September, 1985. A meeting of the Research & Publication committee was held in this Vidyapeetha on 29.9.85 and again on 18.1.86.

A symposium was organised in this Vidyapeetha on 8.2.86 under the Chairmanship of Prof. Dayakrishan to discuss the contribution of East and West in the development of Mathematics. A second meeting on Astronomy and Mathematics was organised on 23.3.86. A ten day camping (20.8.85-29.8.85) was organised to develop oratory in Sanskrit in collaboration with the Sanskrit loving public of Jaipur. The Sanskrit Day was celebrated in the Vidyapeeth under the Chairmanship of Shri Khadga Nath Mishra, Ex-Principal of Maharaja Sanskrit College, Jaipur. The Vidyapeeth also celebrated a communal harmony day on 25.11.85. The Vidyapeeth also organised an Inter College competition on 13-14-3-16 which was participated in by the local students. The first three winners were given prizes. A sports competition was also organised by the students & teachers of the Vidyapeetha.

The Vidyapeetha holds elocution contest on every Thursday to develop oratory power of the students. The Vidyapeeth at present offers hostels facilities to nearly 30 students. At present this Vidyapeetha is running in rented building, but efforts are being made to have own accommodation.

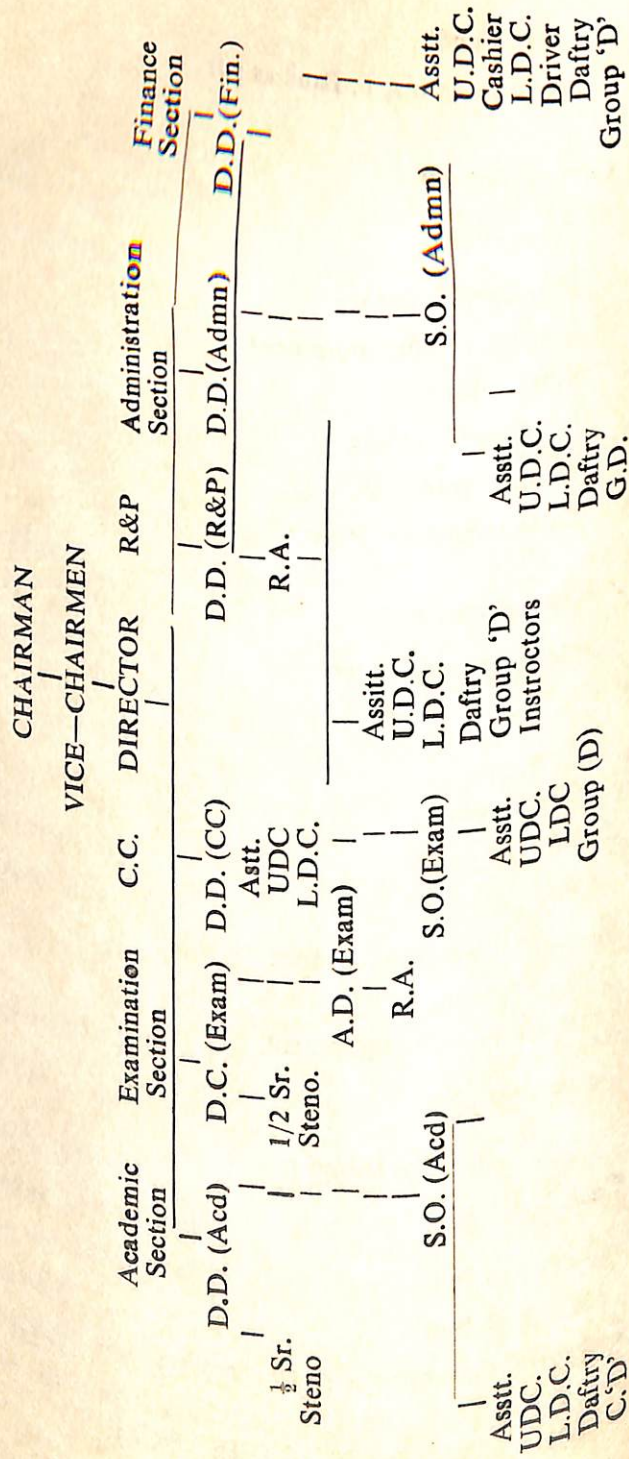

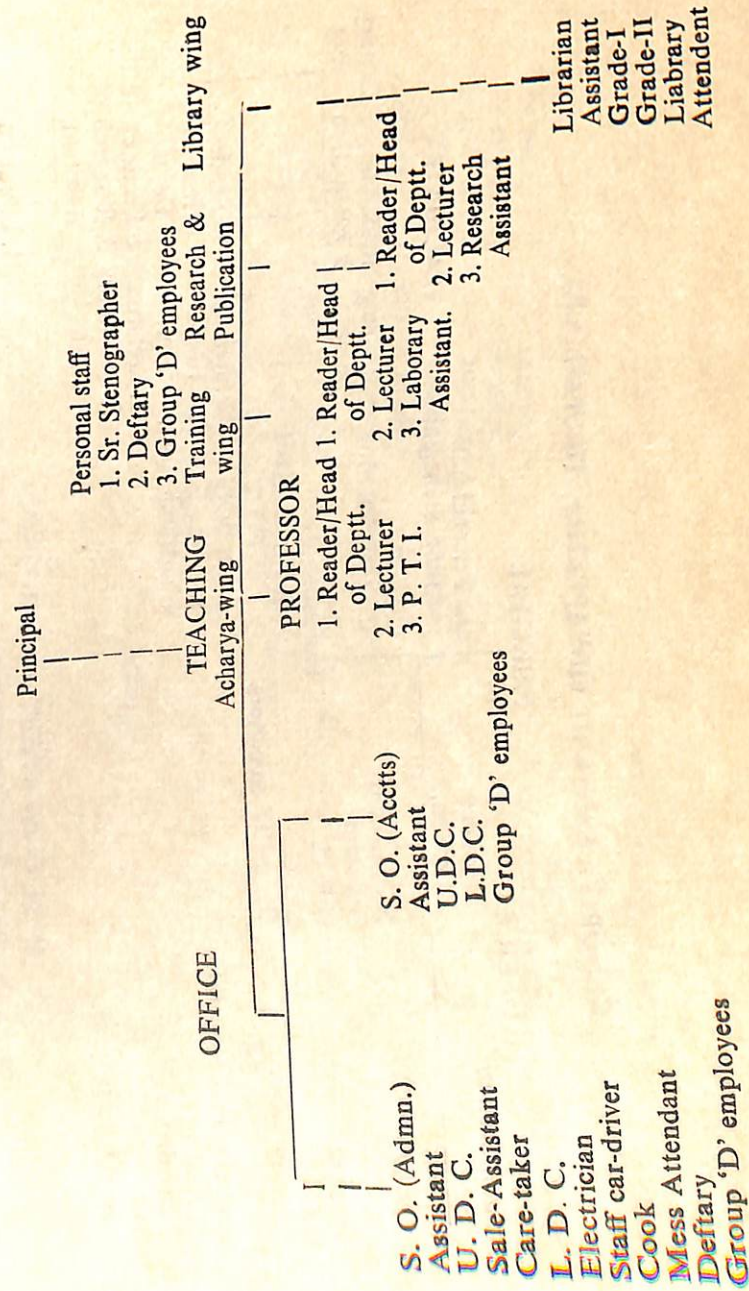

ORGANISATIONAL CHART OF THE HEADQUARTER OFFICE



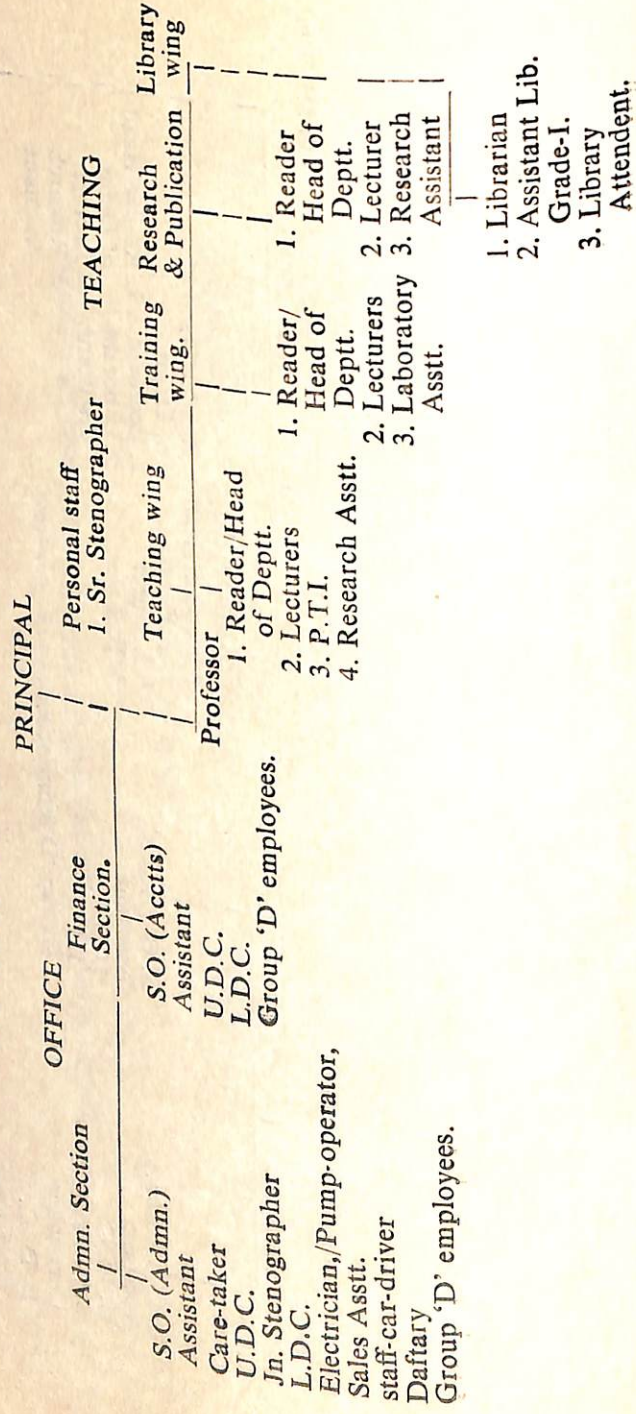
